Ultimate Winter Drivers

Most of us use our BMWs throughout New Jersey's four seasons. This poses the challenge of being safe and having fun in our cars even in the road conditions old man winter sends our way. Want to be the "ultimate winter driver?"

I asked Blake Smith, our chapter's chief driving instructor, to recommend some techniques that are taught at our driver schools and that can be translated into safer street driving. "Everything we do on the track will make you a better, more aware driver on the street. By practicing skills in a controlled environment, we can experience things on the track that don't happen every day on the street," said Blake.

Here are four specific track driving techniques recommended by Blake for street use. Paying attention to these tips will make you a safer driver on the street and ingrain skills that can be used at our track events in the proper season.

Tip number one: look ahead and keep your eyes up. You want to be as aware as possible of road conditions that lie well ahead of your vehicle. By forcing yourself to look as far down the road as possible, you will prepare yourself for changes in traffic conditions, obstacles on the road surface, curves and hills, etc. It's all too easy, especially during that morning commute, to fixate on the bumper of the car or SUV in front of you. By following this tip, you will be able to anticipate the need to provide braking, steering or acceleration inputs to your car much earlier, giving you and your vehicle more time to react and to operate smoothly.

Tip number two: practice good braking technique. Most of your braking should be done while the car is traveling in a straight line. This will lessen or eliminate the need to use your brakes while turning, thus maximizing the stability of your car during a turn. Also, remember that your brakes are not an on/off switch. Try thinking about your brakes as having 10 levels of application, and use every stop as an opportunity to come to a smooth stand still. Be aware of whether your car has anti-lock brakes (most BMWs manufactured since 1990 have it), and if not, practice threshold braking so you won't lose steering control in emergency braking situations.

Tip number three: always know where your car is and look where you want your car to go. Be precise in your thinking about where you want your car to be on the road ahead. Experienced track drivers know that the best way to navigate through any curve in a road is by identifying three critical points: turn in (where you begin your steering input), apex (the point where you start to unwind the steering wheel) and track out (the point where you are back to straight line driving). Try to identify these points for every curve in your commute. Experiment with intentionally setting those points to maximize your car's feeling of stability through the turn. When you find the right "line", practice

being consistent and knowing how much to adjust your speed prior to turn in during all road conditions.


Tip number four: translate your car control skills onto the street. Despite best efforts, occasionally your car will get out of shape. The back end may start to come around (over steer) or you may find that as you enter a turn, no matter how hard you turn the wheel the car does not seem to want to turn in (under steer). What do you do when this happens? Mainly, always look where you want the car to go, NOT where you are afraid it might go. This will tend to direct your hands and feet for proper driving inputs.

Here are some more technical car control tips for rear wheel drive vehicles (most BMW sedans, except "x's"). If the car is under steering: slow down. Backing off the throttle and slightly unwinding the steering input will direct weight to the front of the car and increase traction where the steering happens. If the car is over steering: reduce steering input and do not apply the brakes. If you didn't catch the over steer early enough and the car is entering a skid, counter steer. These techniques have to be learned by feel. A snowy, empty parking lot is a good opportunity to do some low speed, low traction car control work. Watch out for those light poles!!

When it comes to learning driving techniques, there's no substitute for experience. That's what makes our driver schools such a great program. Did you know that the main goal of our driver schools is to teach car control? In addition to getting class room instruction, you also get to practice all of this in a controlled environment with excellent instruction, and then bring those skills back out onto the street with you. I wish all of our club members would take advantage of our driver school program to learn how to become more skilled and safer drivers. But even if you've never participated in one of our driving schools, these tips can be practiced on a daily basis (except I hope number 4) to improve your driving skills and safety.

Vice President

How I Milked an Oil Change for Thanksgiving

Sometimes it just doesn't pay to get a job done too quickly. Like when you're getting paid by the hour in a union shop. Or perhaps when finishing one job at home will simply free up enough time to get more items added to your honey-do list. That's my excuse for milking the oil change on my e39 540 for all it was worth over the recent Thanksgiving break. In the absence of that excuse I might have to admit that I bungled one of the simplest jobs you can still do as a shade-tree mechanic.

About a week and a half before Thanksgiving, I decided to change my oil as a week-night job. I vaguely remember telling my wife that by getting this out of the way during the week I wouldn't be distracted from other household chores on the weekend. Hah! The first sign of trouble came when I tried to start the car to warm it up. I hadn't been using it for a while because I'd decided to use another car while I waited to get to the oil change. Of course, in the interim, my battery went flat. "No problem," I thought "I'll just jump start it." Wrong. The battery had drained beyond the point of being able to be jump started. So I had to remove the battery (my gosh, it's gigantic on that car!) and hook it up to a charger. This was good enough to extend my 20-minute oil change job for at least a couple of days.

Two days later, I was able to get back to it. I reinstalled the battery and got it started. After another few minutes the oil was warm and the front end was up on jack stands. This was more like it. I slid under the car and removed the plastic access panel to get to the oil drain plug. You see where this is headed, right? The next turn of events I blame on: 1) poor vision; 2) attention deficit disorder. I found that I couldn't focus my eyes on the drain plug, but I could see a shiny piece of metal where I knew the drain plug was. It was a safe guess that it would be a 17 mm bolt head (seems like the default bolt/nut size for BMW engineers). But here's where the ADD comes in. I grabbed the first 17 mm socket I could get my hands on. It was a 12 point socket. really should use a 6 point socket to get maximum contact of the socket walls on the thin hex head of the drain plug. But, reveling in the joy of having guessed the right socket size, I impatiently plowed ahead and, you guessed it, I succeeded in rounding off the points of the bolt head. DOH! Not to worry... yet. There's an allen-head slot in the drain plug to be used for just such an emergency. Double-DOH!

That was the launching point to many hours spent progressively worsening the condition of the bolt head by the stubborn and repetitive application of various sizes and shapes of vice-grip pliers and other, ultimately ineffective, tools. All the while being unable to see the drain plug clearly enough to determine if there was any flat surface at all left to bite into! Arrggh!! In a desperate gambit to regain some of my vision, I finally discovered that if I hooked one nose pad of my reading glasses into my left nostril, placed the

glasses on my head at a crooked angle, and tilted my head just right, I could manage to see out of my right eye (if I squinted). This yielded the rather depressing discovery that I had more thoroughly mangled the bolt head than I had imagined and that there was no longer any hope of getting enough grip with any tool to loosen it.

I was now at a fork in the road. Either I could give up and hand the job over to a professional mechanic, or I could try to find another club member to help me out. Pride prohibited my giving up on so simple a job, so I called our chapter tool man, Bob Conway to ask for advice. In addition to being our tool guy, Bob's a friend and has a well equipped garage in his own right. Plus, he keeps a fleet of his family's BMWs, with a collective age of about 75 years and half a million miles, running. I figured if anybody would know how to bale me out it would be Bob.

On the Friday morning after Thanksgiving I headed to Bob' house to get to work with a new drain plug in hand along with my oil, filter & all the plastic shrouding I had removed from under the engine bay. By the way, I'd like to thank the parts guys at Flemington BMW. It made me feel like a valued customer when I went there for a new drain plug and they just handed one over, free of charge!

Our plan was simple and it started with getting my car into Bob's garage. I did mention he has a fleet of BMWs in his driveway, didn't I? That necessitated my backing out of his driveway while he cleared a path to the garage door. In my eagerness to get clear of the driveway, I found the point where the Belgian block curb meets the road by exploring with my rear tires. At this time I'm running out of "DOH!!!"s to use, but here it is: triple-DOH!!! By the time I pulled into Bob's garage I had given my car a flat tire by running up on the curb, as we were alerted by the clearly audible hiss emanating from the rear right wheel. After liberating the long-dormant spare from it's moorings we were back on track with the original task, which in case you've forgotten by now was: change the oil. Bob felt the need to repeat the same course of action I had pursued, using various tools to try to grab the drain plug head. All to no avail. After an hour or so of futile effort, our solution was to weld a 1/4" allen wrench onto the drain plug and thus increase our grip to a useful level. Finally, the plug yielded to our persuasions and we were able to proceed with a normal oil change.

I was pleasantly surprised that Bob would take time out of his holiday weekend to help me out. Thanks Bob! Then at some point, we both remarked on how tackling this oil change job sure beat the heck out of carting our families around on the morning of "Black Friday" to start the Christmas shopping season! See? I told you there are times when milking a job pays off.

Notice that by this time, I'd managed to extend the 20 minute oil change into a job (Continued on Page 11)
