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Random Firings

...Hank Farber

I am living in New York City this year while on sabbatical leave from Princeton, and my experience with the transportation system got me to thinking about the incentives people face at work. Does everyone think about this, or is it only labor economists? Incentives for workers depend on how they are compensated, and there are two standard methods. The first, and most common, is the time rate or hourly wage. The second, and less common, is the piece rate or pay-for-output. Workers on piece rate are generally thought to have a greater incentive to work hard than wokers paid by the hour.

Two important modes of transportation in The City (aside from the subway system) are taxi cabs and buses. Taxi drivers are paid on a piece rate basis: they pay a fixed fee plus fuel to drive a cab for a 12-hour shift, and they keep all fare revenue and tips received. This explains why taxi drivers often seem to be in a hurry. They want to get done with this fare and get on to the next. Drivers are free to determine how many hours they will actually drive during the 12-hour shift, and cab owners don't care how much the drivers work because they have been paid the fixed fee. As part of my research, I have done a detailed statistical analysis of drivers' decisions about how long to drive each day. If you want to learn more about what makes taxi drivers tick, you can read my paper (available at

http://www.irs.princeton.edu/pubs/pdfs/473.pdf).

The point of this discussion is not to tell you about my research. It is to set the stage for a story about a bus driver. Bus drivers are paid on an hourly basis, and this distinction from taxi drivers can explain differences in driving behavior that I have observed.

A few weeks ago, I was taking a bus in Queens (Why, you ask?), and the driver was most interesting. He was a gregarious fellow and quite cheerful. We left LaGuardia Airport, and it was immediately clear that this was no ordinary bus driver. He clearly got entertainment value from commenting on other drivers, driving aggressively, and tweaking other drivers. My first indication of this was while we were waiting behind an SUV (boo, hiss) to make a left turn. The driver of the SUV (boo, hiss) was being exceedingly timid, and the bus driver was amused. Then he did it. He swung around the SUV (boo, hiss) and made the left turn ahead of the poor timid soul. This was done cheerfully and without malice.

At the next corner, a non-descript Japanese sedan (aren't they all) tried to merge in front of the bus. Well our driver would have none of that. Again without malice and with great cheerfulness, he made it impossible for the car to merge in front of us. At the next intersection, the Japanobox driver made a bonzai move around the bus and slowed to about 2 miles per hour for the next two blocks just to piss off our bus driver. And here is where I understood that the bus driver knew what it meant to be a time rate worker. The bus driver leaned out his window and yelled "Who's looks like a jerk now? I get paid by the hour. I got all day."

Finally, the Japanobox turned off, and I thought the rest of the trip would be uneventful. I was wrong. One block later a car was double parked in an inconvenient place although the bus could squeek by. By luck (I am not sure if it was good or bad), a traffic light and cars in front of us left the bus right next to the double-parker. Our driver, cheerfully and without malice, stopped as close to the car as possible without scraping it. At that moment the double-parker came out of an ice cream shop with a cone in his hand and just freaked out. He started screaming at the bus driver and then did something that is incomprehensible to me. The double-parker moved his car even closer to the bus as if to challenge our driver to scrape his car. You can imagine what our driver did. He set the parking brake on the bus, and refused to move until the double-parker backed off. The bus driver said, cheerfully and without malice, "I got all day. I get paid by the hour, you a**-hole. The longer I wait, the more money I make." So there we sat as the cars in front of us disappeared and the cars behind us honked. Finally, our driver tired of the game and eased away from the car, not even scratching it.

The rest of the trip was uneventful aside from a very close move around a delivery truck that had me pull my elbow in the window. I thoroughly enjoyed this ride. I got to watch a terrific drama unfold for free. What great theatre. And I was not even driving. Then I had a sobering thought. Whether I get paid by the hour or paid by the piece, I cannot begin to work until I get where the bus driver is taking me. So I did wind up paying for the entertainment.



Important Information on Minor Waivers

If you've attended any of our driving events you've signed a waiver in order to participate. This is a requirement for our club insurance coverage. In addition to the adult waiver, there is now a requirement that anyone under 18 involved in any driving event have a minor waiver signed by both parents or all legal guardians.

This means you may have to do some advance planning if you bring minors to autocrosses, rallys or driving schools, since multiple signatures may be required on one original waiver form - a document provided by the insurance company. A waiver is required for anyone who will be in a car or in any areas not accessible to the general public. For example, if you are taking the family on the Fun Rally you will need a form for each minor in the car. Being a spectator in a public area will not require a waiver.

The current rules governing Minor Waivers at Driving Events are:

- 1. If both the mother and father have custody, there must be one waiver form bearing both of their signatures.
- 2. If a single parent has sole custody, that parent must sign an "affirmation" to that effect.
- 3. Parents are not required to be present at the event. A minor may bring a pre-signed waiver to an event.
- 4. The waiver can be designated for a single event. As a convenience, one waiver form bearing both parents' signatures, or one parent's signature with the affirmation of sole custody, can be filled out to cover all BMW CCA events at all locations for the entirety of one calendar year.

Minor Waiver Forms will be available at our New Jersey BMW CCA Monthly meetings, autocrosses, driving schools and rallys. You can also send me an email with your name, address, BMW CCA # and number of forms needed and I will mail you the required original forms.

New Requirement for Driver Schools

You may notice that the Driver School applications in this issue now have a requirement that attendees be members of the New Jersey Chapter. In the past the only requirement was that you be a member of the BMW CCA. So, why the change? It's because of an IRS rule that not-for-profit organizations derive a minimum of 85% of their revenue from their own members. Since each chapter of the BMW CCA is an independent entity, the 85% rule is applicable on a chapter-by-chapter basis, not across the BMW CCA organization as a whole. As a result, we've had to make this change.

If you apply to other chapter's drivers schools you may or may not run into this requirement. Each chapter is addressing the "85% rule" in line with their own budgets and needs.

We at Westlake wish you to know how much the support of the New Jersey Chapter of the BMW CCA has meant to us. Your generosity has been part of our lives since June, 1997 and over the past six years you have given our students a wealth of benefits that would not have been possible without you.

Perhaps the following account of your support will serve to remind you of how generous the Club has been and how much we appreciate your involvement.

Dr. Ross Karlin first approached me about the Club's interest in Westlake during the spring of 1997. We had just moved into our new building and needed virtually everything, especially a place for some of our special students to spend their summers. Although (due to an early school closing) we were unable to come to the track and see the race first hand that June, your Club generously dontaned fifteen hundred dollars, and sent six Westlake students to camp for the first time. On December 16, 1997 Club members brought a shiny red BMW race car to school and allowed students to have pictures taken with the car. It was a great day.

Since then your Club's annual contributions have steadily risen and been earmarked for camperships, Student of the Year awards, special apparatus for wheel-chair-bound students (we have twenty-five) to access computers in our computer technology lab, and a pair of adaptive head poitners to enable two wheelchair-bound stduents (who must be ventilated to breathe and only have use of their heads) to communicate online. To date, there have been over fifty camperships funded by your Club over the last five years. A senior has received a two hundred dollar savings bond funded by the NJ BMWCCA at every graduation since 1999, seatbelt safety programs have been given at the school, and plans are being made to have a BMW racecar brought to our June, 2003 carnival.

In summation, the generosity and support we have received from the NJ BMW CCA has been outstanding. We are a tuition-based publich school with over one hundred and forty students, all of whom have physical and/or learning disabilities. Meeting everyone's needs is always a challenge. Women Drivers at Summit Point

Just a few weeks ago, I was the perfectly contented driver of an ordinary four-cylinder Honda Accord, who found nothing at all awkward about driving in a smart pair of stiletto heels.

But that was before my first Driver School May 10-12 at Summit Point Raceway in West Virginia. Since then, I find myself plotting ways to own my own high-performance BMW E30 M3, daydreaming about doing a really skillful heel and toe, and wondering: Why weren't there more women at the track, finding out for themselves just how terrific and fun a Driver School can be?

I must confess, only one of my own three reasons for going had anything to do with driving. I jumped at Hank Farber's invitation for Hank's own good company, and because I know from New Jersey Chapter meetings and events that these members rightfully deserve the chapter's reputation for being the friendliest, funniest, most welcoming car club anywhere.

I also knew the New Jersey chapter was the first BMW Car Club in America to run a Driver School, and I figured 30 years of experience couldn't be beat in teaching me to drive more safely and skillfully.

The school lived up to all my expectations, and then some. In fact, I lived three straight days of highs, from the exhilaration of finally nailing a hairpin turn, to the triumph of bringing a skid under control, to the high-fives and hugs of teammates after a good run. I even found myself speaking and understanding track language by Sunday night, joining in animated, post-barbecue conversations about "finding the line" and "lifting" - or not - in the turn.

Each of our three days started with classroom instruction for my "red group," made up of newer track drivers. Instructor Miriam Schottland, with help from instructor Bill Foster, used everything from humor to physics to stress safety on both track and street, and to teach us non-intuitive skills for keeping the car stable and in control in a wide variety of conditions. "Speed," we were told repeatedly in two classes per day, "is the reward for doing everything else right."

Around classes, we took four runs a day, on a different course each day, accompanied by a veteran driving instructor: in my case, David Wollman of Bucks County, Pa., who managed to increase both my confidence and my

speed with his positive feedback and expert directions. On Saturday and Sunday, we also took turns on the skid pad, where Eric and other instructors showed me it was possible to steer my car with the accelerator, and to keep control in wildly uncontrolled conditions. What looked frightening from the sidelines turned out to be awesome, confidence-boosting fun!

So why were there so few women drivers at the track? It well might be because they're waiting for a personal invitation. Of the eight other women I met, only three came the first time because of an interest in driving. The others, like me, came at the invitation of a boyfriend, father or husband.

What's especially noteworthy is that all the women I talked to were enthusiastic about coming back for another school - or were still enthused about Driver Schools after a decade or more of attending them.

One of these women was classroom Instructor Miriam Schottland, who took her 1982 Porsche 911 to her first Driver School in 1987, coincidentally at Summit Point. A native Manhattanite who had just started driving after a move to Washington D.C., Miriam went because she was "terrified" of her car, which she admitted purchasing only because her commercial artist's eye appreciated its sleek teardrop shape.

"I thought I would be driving in a parking lot with a sea of cones," she laughed. "I spun the car at every turn, and my first instructor said, 'I don't think this is for you.' I went back to the hotel and cried, ready to sell the car. Then decided I wasn't going to let that car get the best of me."

An instructor herself now for the past 13 years, Miriam loves "the challenge of learning how to drive the car well. It's very cerebral and thoughtful."

Two other highly visible women at the track were veteran drivers Elizabeth "Speedy" Swain of Hopewell Township, New Jersey, who travels with the Delaware Valley Chapter's canine mascot Abby, and who is that chapter's driving events registrar; and Deborah Kolar of Neshanic Station, New Jersey, driving events chair for the New Jersey Chapter.

Speedy took her first Driver School 10 years ago with her dad, Gene Schaeffer, Delaware Valley Chapter Technical Inspection Chairman. The pair has been into cars "since I was born," she said. After their first school, "We said, we have to continue to do this. This has got to be a part of our lives."

Speedy, who works as an accounting manager and drives a BMW E30 M3, said she returns for "the challenge of driving better every time. I also love instructing. And for me, it's all about driving faster, how many brake pads and tires I can use up in one season."

Deborah Kolar also joined her first Driver School 10 years ago, after watching races at Lime Rock Park in Lakeville, Connecticut, and realizing, "I didn't want to be just a spectator, but a participant."

But it's skillful driving, not racing, in her 1995 BMW E36 M3 that is Deborah's prime motivation. "What you find

out on the track is that you can always learn more, and always do better," she said. "It's totally involving, and bottom line, it's a lot of fun."

Penny Vanderpool of Bridgewater, New Jersey, started track driving last year at her boyfriend's suggestion, and said, "I'm still surprised I love it so much. I grew up in northern California on twisting roads, and as a kid I tried to go 50 when the speed limit was 25, so I guess this is a natural progression."

Like many other drivers, Penny said driving her 1991 BMW 325i at the track was her escape from "an intense, high-stress job," in her case as a magazine publisher.

"This is the one place I can come and focus only on this. This is the whole world, right here, right now, and there are no other demands on me," she said.

Pamela Conway of Whitehouse Station, New Jersey, tried track driving for the first time two years ago with her dad, Bob, as a belated 18th birthday gift in safety instruction. Now her mom, Susan, and brother Greg are also track regulars and "the garage at home is always buzzing."

"We were blown away by how much fun it is," said Pamela, who drives a 1988 BMW E30. "I saw the track, and said, 'Oh my God, I've been waiting for this my whole life.' I love competing with myself to do better. When you hit one turn right, it's golden."

Three other women attending Driver School for the first time were enthused for differing reasons.

Andrea Appel of Vernon, New Jersey, found the school, "a good opportunity to learn limits of my car," a 1995 Eagle Talon TSI. "It's like starting a new job," she said of her first two days at the track with friend Jeff Smith. "You're

really concentrating, using your brain and all of your muscles. I realize now what great shape race car drivers must be in."

Kathi Stine of Ijamsville, Maryland, came to her first school in the family's daily driver, a Plymouth Horizon, but will come back with an Omni GLH that her husband Dave, a driving instructor, is now rebuilding. "I'm not out there to become a racer, I'm out there to improve my own driving," she said. A corner worker for a private driver school, Kathi gave this school high marks for being well-organized and running on time.

Casey Hand of Philadelphia said before taking her Nissan Sentra to this first Driver School, "I thought it was all about speed. Then I started watching Formula One racing on TV, and noticed it's not just big egos driving fast, it's about skill."

A flight attendant, Casey suspects women have a driving edge. "The pilots tell me women pilots land the planes better, because they make better visual contact. Driver School is definitely something women should try," she said.

I agree. Riding the track with Hank in his E30 M3 and watching him do with apparent ease everything I still aspire to do showed me what is possible. I can't wait to go back. But off track, I'm keeping the stiletto heels.


